

- * Your legislators WANT to hear from you
- You are the expert. Your story helps legislators understand
 - * Barriers and issues you & your family face
 - * Gaps in the mental health system
- Advocacy draws attention to issues your legislator does not have first-hand knowledge about

Within this presentation this symbol (+) indicates a time when NAMI Mass may ask members to advocate



- Each legislative session is 2 years long January of an odd year to July of the following year (i.e. Jan 2019- July 2020)
- * A bill is filed (or refiled) in the House/Senate by a **sponsor**. Any additional supporters are **co-sponsors**. (+)
- * About 6,500 bills are filed each session

MA Legislative Process





* Each bill is assigned to a committee and by law each bill must have public hearing

- Committee hearings feature many bills; they can be several hours long
- Legislators, advocates and other stakeholders provide written or oral testimony (+)
- * After the hearing, the committee votes on how to support the bill



- * Any bill that impacts state finance comes to this Committee
- The committee may hold a second hearing, make amendments to the bill, combine it with other bills, or do nothing. (+)
- * The committee votes on how to support the bill and reports out



- A bill is sent to the floor; it may be debated and amended before a vote (+)
- * If the bill is approved, it moves on to the next branch to repeat the process

An Idea is introduced Committee Hearing House Ways & Means

Conference Committee

* It is common for both the House and Senate to pass different versions of the same legislation. The Conference Committee is formed to agree on one version.

Floor vote

- * Three members from each branch are appointed by leadership to serve on the Conference Committee
- * When a final version is reached, it is returned to each branch to vote on without any changes.

Conference Committee

- * The governor has 10 days to sign, veto or return it with changes
- If a bill does not reach this stage it can be refiled in the next session

- Agencies, like DMH, submit spending dlatocacy opportunities (+)
- Administration holds open hearings
- Governor proposes budget priorities, called House 1, by January 4th

When to Advocate

- Bills, amendments and budget asks go through a multi-step process.
- * Each time a hurdle is cleared, we need to renew our advocacy *success means asking again*!
 - * Co-sponsors
 - Committee members
 - * Oral or Written Testimony
 - * Votes & support
 - * Budget asks & amendments

- * Promote your positions through social media
- <u>Attend</u> local events town halls, town meeting, town events
- * <u>Meet</u> your legislators or with their aides
- * <u>Testify</u> at hearings

Statewide Behavioral Health Training Program for Police and First Responders (Senate Bill #1090, House Bill #3257, and House Bill #2401)

NAMI Massachusetts supports the creation of a statewide resource to expand Crisis Intervention Team training, and the establishment of the Criminal Justice and Community Support Trust Fund.

Overview:

Massachusetts needs a statewide resource for Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training and support to improve police response to people with mental health conditions.

The Need:

- ⇒ Police are the gatekeepers of the criminal justice system and protectors of public health.
- ⇒ Police training and practices are widely inconsistent across the state – approximately 75% of police departments have not had CIT training.
- ⇒ Without appropriate training and procedures, police interactions can escalate quickly, especially when mental health or substance use issues are involved.
- ⇒ Devastating consequences can result: unnecessary arrest or incarceration, or in the worst cases, injury or death.
- ⇒ In Massachusetts, 50% of county jail and house of correction inmates receive mental health services; many of these arrests are for minor, "quality of life" offenses.

The Solution:

A Statewide Comprehensive Training Program will:

- ⇒ Serve as a clearinghouse of best practices in crisis response and de-escalation.
- ⇒ Provide 40-hour Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) trainings.
- Foster partnerships between police and community organizations.
- ⇒ Provide technical assistance to adapt police policies and procedures.

The Criminal Justice and Community Support Trust Fund will create a funding mechanism for these initiatives.

What is CIT?

A 40-hour interactive training model for first responders that brings together police officers, community organizations, health providers, and individuals and family members with lived experience to improve responses to people in mental health crisis:

- De-escalation techniques
- Recognition of the signs and symptoms of mental health and substance use disorders
- Referral to appropriate resources and treatment

The Criminal Justice and Community Support Trust Fund would allow private grants, public funds, and donations to be collected and leveraged to fund:

- Jail diversion programs for people experiencing behavioral health crises;
- Mental health and substance use training for police officers;
- Grants to plan and implement police drop off centers for individuals with behavioral health needs.

Sharing Your Story

- Legislators rely on experts (you) for information.
 - * Your story cannot be wrong; it's your own personal experience.
 - * Your experience has value and meaning.
 - * Keep it brief/stick to highlights think movie trailer.
 - * Emotion should move, not overwhelm.
 - * You don't have to have all of the answers, just a clear "ask."






